

One can play the game or even shoot an occasional 80 with an unconventional swing or style. However, if he wants to shoot consistent par, he must learn the proven basics. He must practice the time tested and proven methods in order to have the consistent results to become a professional. Many excellent turners have said there is no "right way... whatever works for you is good enough," which is, of course, is up to the individual. However, it seems there is a right and wrong way if you want to be a Tiger Woods. COMMENTS AND BACKGROUND FROM PHIL HOUCK

"I worked at the sheet metal trade for 44 years and most of those 44 years involved shop fabrication and welding in the commercial and industrial segment of the trade.

Since retirement two years ago, I find myself wondering how I ever had time to work.

My first experience to wood turning was sometime back in the late 80's, about 1987 or '88. I happened to be over at Woodcraft Supply one Saturday and Lee Carter was there doing a woodturning demonstration. I got so captivated and enthralled in watching him, I knew I had to try this. Needless to say I got hooked in short order.

I' have always had a love affair with wood, like building cabinets and things of this nature, but there's just something about the sight of shavings coming off a piece of rotating wood and the feel of the tool in your hand making those shavings come off that nothing else compares to. Another thing about turning that appeals to me is being able to use wood that other wood workers such as cabinet makers and carpenters can't use. What they regard as trash is often our treasure.

The Front Range Woodturners has been a great source of inspiration and help to me. Prior to any formal instruction or training in lathe work, I benefited from our monthly demonstrations like proficient turners such as Pete Holtus and others through the 13 or 14 years that I've been a member of F.R.W.

Another source of help to me is our library of first rate books and videos on the subject of turning. Watching a video, in my opinion, is one of the best learning mediums we have, outside of a one on one hands on session with a proficient turner. The nice thing about a video is being able to stop the VCR, back it up and keep reviewing a technique that's a bit more difficult to comprehend. Having a library such as ours, you can check out the books and videos and review them and then decide about buying one for your own personal library.

My first experience at any formal training in turning was in April of 2000 when I went to Arrowmont school of Arts and Crafts in Gatlinburg, Tenn., where I had a 5-day course in turning with Lyle Jamison. Then this last March, I did a 3-day work shop with Lee Carter.

Needless to say, the time went entirely too fast. Lee is not only a top notch instructor, he's just a prince of an individual that you enjoy being associated with.

I think it's a combination of all these turning experiences that I've mentioned that keeps my appetite for turning whetted and the creative juices flowing. I know it certainly continues to be a challenge and inspiration for me."


I regret to inform you that we have lost two of our members.
