November Presenter

Our speaker at the November meeting will be Fred Wilson from Longmont. Fred is an amateur woodworker who exhibits his creativity and design skills in his projects. His projects cover a wide range including: furniture, water craft, sculpture, and simply creative art. He uses a wide range of ideas and skills to build

some stunning pieces, one of whom was featured in the February issue of Fine Woodworking in 2007. His shop appears like most amateur hobby shops; however, the items that it creates belies the simplicity of the workshop. He uses a strobe light and an overhead projector to create a three dimensional image, his projects tend to have no square corners, his work is structured from sensuous curves and



seemingly light airy frames that are surprisingly strong. His chairs are held together with a small joint that he invented and the joints are almost indestructible, yet his chairs flex when you sit on them. His paddles have ergonomic curves and lightness that makes one want to touch and hold them; they are created from layers in a vacuum jig that he invented; which is powered by his shop vac. He heard about the French traders who had chests shaped like a canoe to carry their goods; so he too developed chests shaped like a canoe. His shop is strewn with objects that intrigue, inventions, ideas, curved shaped things, pieces from past projects, and ideas that flow across the walls and peek out at you from his creative diamond shaped shelves. This might well be a presentation that shakes all of us from our standard methods and approaches to design and move our projects into a curved world.. the natural world that is around us.

Have you had a workshop related accident?

In the last couple of months, I've talked to a couple of members that told me they had a workshop related accident that resulted in either broken bones or stitches. Inevitably the conversation usually starts out with "I did a stupid thing....". I'm guessing that when we think about the incident in retrospect, we realize that it was a stupid move, but at the time it happened we thought it was safe or we were just in a hurry. When I had an accident, I didn't think I was doing anything unsafe. I had a work piece that had a piece sticking out which made it impossible to ride flush against my table saw miter gauge. I figured if I just stuck a filler piece of wood between the work piece and the miter gauge everything would work just fine. Wrong! This setup created a kickback which threw my left finger into the blade. I was fortunate in that all I had were a few stitches and didn't lose the finger. If you've had an accident and would like to relate it to us, you could be saving another woodworker from experiencing the same result, especially if you can provide an alternative procedure. Stanley Aquires Black & Decker

The Stanley Works acquired Black & Decker today, creating a company with an estimated worth of \$8.4 billion. Stanley makes the Bostitch line of nailers, and B&D is the parent company of DeWalt and Porter-Cable, brands familiar to woodworkers and builders alike.

The deal, which was approved by the boards of directors of both companies, is expected to close in the first half of 2010. The next step is to put this before the shareholders and regulators.

Stanley and Black & Decker together will have a comprehensive offering across all major tool categories and greater resources to support continued expansion of our combined security and industrial businesses. The transaction is expected to create tremendous value for shareholders of both companies. It's been a tough year for companies in the construction and tool market. Consolidations and mergers can create strength, but they can also cause dificulties. The purchase of Delta and Porter-Cable by B&D from Pentair in 2004 resulted in hiccups with warehousing and distribution. For Connecticut, the home state of Stanley and The Taunton Press, it appears to be good news as a local company with a long history bolsters its size. Some local business leaders were optimistic about the news.

We have no word yet on whether the merger will result in any changes in the current lineup of tools or other products offered by these companies. But as tool news goes, this is one big mashup of global giants.

Cal's Doll Cases

For our mini demo in our October 20th meeting, Cal Noguchi showed us how he makes Japanese doll cases. The cases are very delicate, of differing sizes, have glass side-walls and top and a solid bottom. Cal explained that he made his first case in response to a request for a case for a doll that was being raffled off for charity. Since then he has made several others. The cases also serve nicely to display small pieces of sculpture.

He uses hardwood materials to assemble the top, bottom and stiles so that they hold the glass panels. These sections are delicate, thin pieces, made with miter joints (for the top and bottom) using splines for strength and all featuring grooves to hold the glass panels.

Cal showed us the jigs he uses for cutting the spline grooves. In some cases the pieces are so thin, he must insert the splines on the outside (top).

Cal has supplied us with his SketchUp drawings, an accessory Excel spreadsheet and a simple set of instructions. All of these are available in the member area of our website. You can use these "tools" to design your own cases. Nice work Cal!




John Hammer shows us the coat rack/shelf that he is making for Christmas
