Meeting Presentations

June 2024 Meeting

On June 18th, 2024, the guild enjoyed a very educational presentation by Tom Grager of Urban Forest Mill, one of our 18 sponsors, on various kiln wood drying methods. He started out in industrial arts shop teaching and was a contractor in Boulder CO for 15 years, but in 2020 started his own business, Urban Forest Mill in Longmont, CO. All his wood comes from downed trees as an arborist. and cuts them into large slabs from trees up to 5 feet in diameter. His services include milling, slabbing, planing and sanding, wide slab flattening, and air and vacuum kiln drying. He discussed the challenges of wood moisture content and how it can cause wood to bend and change shape.

He discussed greenwood moisture content and the difference in content between Eastern US woods and the West and Southwest wood content of 7%. He then went into great detail discussing various typer of kiln dryers, including air drying, solar kilns, conventional temperature kilns, dehumidifying kilns and the vacuum kiln method he is perfecting.

The session was extremely educational, and he answered numerous questions after his presentation. Check out all Urban Forest Mill has to offer by following the link here :<u>https://urbanforestmill.com/services/</u>

Education Corner

What is Federal Style Furniture?

Federal Style is a classic of American furniture making. If you were to go back in time to the earliest days of the Country, 1780s – 1820s, you would notice examples of this syle in many of the most affluent homes of the East Coast. Like the architecture from which it was inspired, Federal style was influenced by classic Palladian influences, that is, influences from the Renaissance architect Andrea Palladio's book, *I quattro libri dell'architettura* (The Four Books of Architecture), published in 1570. Palladio's influence in American design can be seen in Thomas Jefferson's Montecello home, whose West Portico prominently displayed Doric columns.

When looking at Federal Style furniture, you will notice strong references to geometric forms, straight legs, contrasting veneers, and geometric inlay. Think of Greek and Roman traditions applied to 18th and 19th century furniture. Some of the major woodworkers in this style included John and Thomas Seymour, Duncan Phyfe, and Charles-Honoré Lannuier.

Duncan Phyfe was perhaps the best-known furniture maker of the Federal style period. Born in Scotland, he immigrated to the USA at age 18 with his family. He married at age 25, in 1793, at which point he was listed as a cabinetmaker in New York City. He lived the American Dream. Arriving here in poverty, he became wealthy and famous due to his dedication to the craft. During his heyday, however, having a 'Duncan Phyfe' in your furniture collection was a sign of prestige.
