• Duane Holmes showed off a China Cabinet via pictures as it was too large to bring in.



Meeting Presentations

September 2024 Meeting

On September 17th, 2024, Kevin Loyd and Bill Bixby gave "part 2" of their presentation on hand tool restoration techniques, with a special focus on how to tune up hand planes.

The beginning of the presentation Hand Tool Restoration & Tune-up is here. It goes from about 54mm into the meeting until the end of the meeting at about 2hh24mm. Again, for the presentation, you may have to "right click" and select "Open Hyperlink" to get to the video.

Kevin went into detail on how to diagnose problems associated with a used hand plane, and what steps are necessary to properly tune that plane for peak performance. This included frog alignment, correcting improperly machined castings, what to do with cracks, and how to adjust wooden bodied planes. Bill covered how to re-do the black japanning on hand tools, and how nickel electroplating can be done at the home shop. They also talked about which after-market upgrades and modern steel blade replacements folks should look for. They capped things off by having participants of the "Rust Bucket Challenge" present the tools they had restored to their former glory.

Stan Wolpert also brought in several hand planes from his collection that he had restored over the years, and also helped with judging the competition.

Education Corner

The Urban Wood Network

For this month's Education Corner, we are talking with Thaddeus Driscoll about the Urban Wood Network. As you will recall, the Guild hosted Tom Graber in June of this year. As you can read on Tom's website, his goal is to give city trees a second life (https://urbanforestmill.com/). As the Urban Wood Network defines it, urban wood is "Any wood that was not harvested for its timber value and was diverted or removed from the wastestream and developed or redeveloped into a product. Urban wood can come from 3 sources: Deconstruction, Fresh cut urban trees, and Salvaged Trees" (https://urbanwoodnetwork.org).

Thaddeus is a great advocate of this thinking. Thaddeus lives in Denver and works as the Urban Wood Program Facilitator for the Colorado State Forestry Service. He and I spoke about the importance of sourcing Urban Woods.



Jonathan: What is the Urban Wood Network?

Thaddeus: The Urban Wood Network is an industry group of craftsmen, arborists, sawmills, cities, and designers who come together to educate and support use of city/urban trees in woodworking and craftsmanship.

Jonathan: Why should woodworkers care about urban wood?

Thaddeus: More trees coming out of cities are thrown away then used. While hard and softwood lumber is shipped in from out of state, country, and continent. Urban wood is inherently local and small business oriented. Sawmills are often artists/craftsman and vice versa. The story of these trees is the story of craftsmanship local craftsmanship Colorado. Often overlooked and forgotten. Swapped out for products and material coming from far away and large companies. Local lumber is inherently sustainable and environmentally friendly. Its story and the story of craftsmanship here are elevated together.

Jonathan: How can we get more involved?

The best thing woodworkers in Colorado can do is purchase their wood from local mills and tell people about it. Adam Savage a famous maker has a great quote "make cool stuff but tell everyone about it". I'd like to add to that with "make cool stuff but tell everyone about it and where it came from. A coworker of mine when I worked at Rockler also gave a great piece of advice "when you buy lumber and you don't know where it came from its history starts with you, but when you know its story, its history goes back further and makes the piece more complex."





As the Urban Wood Network explains: "We are doing more than just saving trees and wood from a waste stream, we are giving them a second life at their highest use by promoting the robust supply chain necessary to get the highest use product from these trees."

Thaddeus will be joining us at an upcoming guild meeting, where he will be available during the break to talk to anyone interested in learning more.
