### **Holiday Gifts**

Only one month left to build your Holiday gifts!

There are two ways to approach building a project:

- Find a plan, go buy the materials (add 20%), and then build according to your plan.
- Gather scrap around your shop and ask what do these pieces want to become?

For Holiday gifts, I suggest the second approach:

- You already have the material on hand, so it costs very little money.
- You can open up space in your shop.
- Since it takes 50 years to grow a tree, we should strive for minimal waste. (Native Americans demonstrated this concept by using all parts of the buffalo.)
- There is deep satisfaction in making something beautiful from what might otherwise be tossed or burned.
- Small gifts are generally quicker to make so you can give nice gifts to more people.
- Hand-made gifts generally mean more to family and friends than what you buy.

So, lay out your scrap on the bench and get started.

- Generate ideas, think outside the box, and try something new
  - Scan books and magazines
  - o Browse online
  - o Brainstorm with a friend
- Start with the larger pieces and work down to the smaller ones
- Consider laminating smaller pieces
- Use contrasting colors of wood

If your experience is like mine, once you begin thinking, you will come up with a whole range of ideas. Pick the best ones and get started.

On October 15<sup>th</sup>, 2024, up-and-coming furniture maker and designer, Reagan Zubiate, presented at the October meeting of the Guild. She talked about her Morii chair. Among the fascinating steps she followed, Reagan explained how she used coopering techniques to create the curve of the seat to imitate the lily flower. Also, she explained how one of her glue-ups took an entire month. For each individual lamination, Reagan let the mold set for 24 hours. She had 30 laminations in all!



### **Education Corner**

#### The Medallions on Disston Saws

The rust bucket challenge has brought attention to how many excellent tools await us, hidden only behind a bit of elbow grease. I recently purchased two Disston Saws off of Facebook Marketplace. The saws were being sold at an affordable price. But, even so, did I pay too much? Conversely, did I strike it rich?

Disston Saws have an entire institute devoted to their history in the saw making business. The web page <a href="https://www.disstonianinstitute.com/">https://www.disstonianinstitute.com/</a> will provide you with more the most comprehensive information on all aspects of the Disston Saw history. This current education corner will look at only one aspect of this history: the medallions.



The medallions tell an amazing story of each Disston saw. As the Institute indicates, "The medallions on Disston handsaws changed more over time than any other feature on the saw. By using the medallion, you can estimate the age of your saw" (<a href="https://www.disstonianinstitute.com/medv2.html">https://www.disstonianinstitute.com/medv2.html</a>).

One of the Disston Saws I purchased had this medallion:



According to the Disstonian Institute Website, this medallion is from the period of 1896 - 1917



These medallions are 1" in diameter and found on full-sized handsaws. The reference to "PHILADA" proves that this saw is from the 1896-1917 period. Saws from 1917-1940 had a similar medallion, but the location reference was "PHILA". By 1940, the Disston Company had removed the reference to Philadelphia and started using "U.S.A" as the location. Saws made until 1950 with the U.S.A reference are the last saws made by the Disston family.

Saws in good condition from the earlier part of this period can go for upwards to a \$1000 on Ebay

(<u>https://www.ebay.com/itm/154399788538?chn=ps&mkevt=1&mkcid=28</u>). However, the majority are selling for around \$150. So, *caveat emptor*, let the buyer beware!

On the other hand, the other saw I purchased has this medallion:



This medallion is from 1950 or later. The saws with this medallion were made, "after the family sold their company to HK Porter, Inc. The variety and quality of saws decreased immediately, as did the number of employees in the factory" (<a href="https://www.disstonianinstitute.com/medv2.html">https://www.disstonianinstitute.com/medv2.html</a>). These saws are valued at around \$30.

Every tool has a story to tell. The medallions on the Disston Saws tell the story of their manufacture. However, the more moving story was told by the lady from whom I purchased the saws. She shared with me the memories of her father using the saws as she was growing up. I may not have struck it rich with my purchases, but the emotional durability of making these connections through our tools is priceless.

His bottom-line advice was to do periodic maintenance on your equipment to avoid danger and prevent equipment failures.

**Shop Tours:** We offered our thanks to Doug Pinney for hosting the tour of his shop last week. Doug's expertise in CNC as well as other woodworking pursuits was on display as he generously toured his first-class shop and offered expert advice to those interested in getting started in the world of CNC woodworking.

#### **Show & Tell:** We had three entries this month:

Bill Schlittler showed two electric guitar bodies that he made from wood collected by his neighbor, who had donated the amp and speaker we've been using at our meetings. He gave a nice overview of the process of lying out and routing the various cavities that hold the electronics.



Charles House showed a lathe-turned planter made of walnut, maple and cherry.



Roger Rayburn won "best of show' with a display of funeral urns as well as a sample from a collection of caterpillars and cars he made. The urns were made from Ipe that was recovered from a dismantled deck and finished with a 1-2-3 varnish mix.
